EVENTS AND VISITS

BEING WITH OBJECTS: Slinkachu (b. 1979, Devon, UK artist)) has been "abandoning" his miniature people on the streets of cities around the world since 2006. Informed by the work of Slinkachu, young artists at TCES were invited to experiment with new ways of experiencing the world. They have engaged with familiar tools and objects in the classroom, in a way that was personal to them. This therapeutic approach to art production allowed these young artists to

communicate how they experience the chosen objects and opened up a space for communicating ideas where empathy and creativity come together.

These small pieces are now on display in the school reception in an exhibition called 'Being with Objects' and is part of a larger project where students will be creating immersive life size art installations that represent personal experiences of the world.







TCES NORTH WEST VISITS THE NEW VANGUARD PHOTOGRAPHY EXHIBITION AT THE SAATCHI GALLERY

The New Black Vanguard exhibition presents artists whose vibrant portraits and conceptual images fuse the genres of art and fashion photography in ways that breakdown long-established boundaries. GCSE students at TCES visited the exhibition to inform their art projects. They were excited to engage and examine the artwork. The images on display opened up conversations around the representation of the Black body and Black lives as subject matter. The works and discussions were used as a starting point that fed into a workshop where young artists developed personal responses to the ideas discussed; an exercise of visual activism that advocates for diversity and new ways of being in the world. This starting point will support young artists' art projects in embracing new perspectives on notions of race, beauty, gender and power.





BLACK HISTORY MONTH

To celebrate Black History Month students took part in a variety of activities. In classrooms students looked at the life of inspirational black people from Mohammed Ali to our very own Spanish teacher relative, Mareena Robinson Snowden, the first black woman to earn a Ph.D. in nuclear engineering from M.I.T. Additionally class tutor groups created presentations of Black Inventors, Pioneers and Scientists in a school competition. We also had the following events in school:

- Ruby Reads Black Bookseller stall where students could purchase books celebrating black culture and diversity for their classrooms
- An African drumming workshop and storytelling session
- Tribal Mask making
- Uncs Musical performance and workshop





At the end of the month's celebration, we had a Black Culture celebration dropdown afternoon. This included performances, a fashion show, and opportunities for classes to present their research projects.



MACMILLAN COFFEE MORNING

Students got out their aprons and baking trays to raise money for Macmillan Cancer Support. Macmillan Cancer Support is one of the largest British charities and provides specialist health care, information and financial support to people affected by cancer. This year students raised £423.
